Results & Conclusion	Results: In the previous three years, this goal was not met. Conclusions: The multiple choice exam is not an appropriate measure of the learning outcome. First, the students typically complete the exam several semesters after completing the research methods course. Second, students are aware that they need a passing score across all portions of the exam and may employ strategic study methods to achieve this goal (ie focusing on earning a high score on one section to offset a low score in a different section). Finally, the exam is multiple choice and while application questions can take the form of multiple choice questions, the questions on this exam lean heavily on "memory" and "understanding" rather than application.
